Later in 1517, the energizing drink reached Rome, where it was widely accepted and even baptized by the Pope.

Coffee Haciendas The Caribbean, 1700s

It wasn't until the early 1700s that coffee made its way to the Caribbean. After many failed attempts to grow the bean in colder climates, European travelers were pleasantly surprised to find the cooler mountain air of tropical lands such as Puerto Rico yielded copious amounts of the bean. With a growing demand, more land owners devoted their Haciendas to the planting, cultivation, and roasting of coffee. This systematic approach allowed farmers to produce a higher quality product, one that would become increasingly more sought after around the world.
